Next Steps for Educators

At-Risk Identification

In just 30 minutes, without the pressure of a high-stakes assessment, incoming students answer 108 online questions about themselves. ACT Engage reports can be easily configured by assessment date range and student demographic information. Schools can seamlessly manage all reports and data in our easy-to-use online system. **[View ACT Engage sample reports.](#)**

Results from ACT Engage reports are available immediately upon students' completion of the online assessment. Those students identified as having the highest risk of running into academic difficulty, or even dropping out, are contacted by advisors or student affairs staff to have one-on-one conversations. These interventions typically are conducted as soon as possible in the fall semester. This early action helps build a positive foundation for the rest of a student's college career.

Intervention

From here, advisors first focus on student strengths, then needs, and then finding resources that can help address specific needs. If a student has many needs, the advisor can focus on those they are best equipped to address (e.g., residence hall directors focusing on student involvement).

A “crosswalk” of campus resources can be used to connect students with appropriate resources. The University of North Texas developed the table on the next page to address issues associated with different ACT Engage scores.
