THE SOLUTION

North Carolina was already investing in ACT solutions for grades 8 and 10 by using ACT Explore® and ACT Plan® as diagnostic assessments and administering the ACT® test to all high school juniors.

The state chose to add a requirement that all seniors enrolled in CTE programs take the three WorkKeys assessments required for the National Career Readiness Certificate[™] (NCRC®).

In addition to the NCRC having identical requirements to the state CRC, it also gave students another credential to document the foundational workplace skills that employers value.
