The Condition of College & Career Readiness 2018

Pennsylvania Key Findings

Performance

- In the 2018 Pennsylvania graduating class, 27,694 graduates (20 percent) took the ACT test with a Composite score average of 23.5. This compares to 27,136 (19 percent) with an average of 22.7 in 2014. Nationally, 55% of 2018 graduates took the ACT with an average Composite score of 20.8.
 - ~ There were 2,473 African American graduates from Pennsylvania who took the ACT (9 percent) with an average Composite score of 17.8. This compares to 2,747 (9 percent) with an average of 18.0, and 2,800 (10 percent) with an average of 17.0, for the 2017 and 2014 graduating classes, respectively.
 - ~ There were 19,645 White graduates from Pennsylvania who took the ACT (71 percent) with an average Composite score of 24.2. This compares to 21,971 (71 percent) with an average of 24.4, and 19,517 (72 percent) with an average of 23.5, for the 2017 and 2014 graduating classes, respectively.
 - ~ There were 1,394 Hispanic graduates from Pennsylvania who took the ACT (5 percent) with an average Composite score of 21.6. This compares to 1,469 (5 percent) with an average of 21.8, and 1,227 (5 percent) with an average of 20.3, for the 2017 and 2014 graduating classes, respectively.
 - ~ There were 1,551 Asian graduates from Pennsylvania who took the ACT (6 percent) with an average Composite score of 25.8. This compares to 1,782 (6 percent) with an average of 25.4, and 1,332 (5 percent) with an average of 23.6, for the 2017 and 2014 graduating classes, respectively.
- The 2018 Pennsylvania graduating class average English score was 23.3. This compares to 23.4 and 22.1 in 2017 and 2014, respectively.
- The 2018 Pennsylvania graduating class average math score was 23.2. This compares to 23.4 and 22.8 in 2017 and 2014, respectively.
- The 2018 Pennsylvania graduating class average reading score was 24.0. This compares to 24.2 and 23.0 in 2017 and 2014, respectively.
- The 2018 Pennsylvania graduating class average science score was 23.1. This compares to 23.3 and 22.2 in 2017 and 2014, respectively.
- In 2018, 43 percent of Pennsylvania graduates met all four ACT College Readiness Benchmarks. This compares to 45 and 38 percent of 2017 and 2014 graduates, respectively.
 - ~ In 2018, 16 percent of Pennsylvania graduates met zero ACT College Readiness Benchmarks. This compares to 15 and 20 percent of 2017 and 2014 graduates, respectively.
 - ~ In 2018, 80 percent of Pennsylvania graduates met the ACT English College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 80 and 75 percent of 2017 and 2014 graduates, respectively.
 - 2018 Pennsylvania graduates taking more advanced English coursework demonstrated markedly higher average English scores than those who did not. In fact, 80 percent of Pennsylvania 2018 graduates taking four or more years of English met the ACT English College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 61 percent of students taking less than four years of English meeting the benchmark.



- ~ In 2018, 60 percent of Pennsylvania graduates met the ACT Math College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 62 and 59 percent of 2017 and 2014 graduates, respectively.
 - 2018 Pennsylvania graduates taking more advanced math coursework demonstrated markedly higher average math scores than those who did not. In fact, 61 percent of Pennsylvania 2018 graduates taking three or more years of math met the ACT Math College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 14 percent of students taking less than three years of math meeting the benchmark.
- ~ In 2018, 64 percent of Pennsylvania graduates met the ACT Reading College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 66 and 55 percent of 2017 and 2014 graduates, respectively.
 - · 2018 Pennsylvania graduates taking more advanced social studies coursework demonstrated markedly higher average reading scores than those who did not. In fact, 64 percent of Pennsylvania 2018 graduates taking three or more years of social studies met the ACT Reading College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 62 percent of students taking less than three years of social studies meeting the benchmark.
- ~ In 2018, 55 percent of Pennsylvania graduates met the ACT Science College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 55 and 49 percent of 2017 and 2014 graduates, respectively.
 - · 2018 Pennsylvania graduates taking more advanced science coursework demonstrated markedly higher average science scores than those who did not. In fact, 56 percent of Pennsylvania 2018 graduates taking three or more years of science met the ACT Science College Readiness Benchmark. This compares to 27 percent of students taking less than three years of science meeting the benchmark.
- In 2018, 16,235 (59 percent) of Pennsylvania graduates met three or four ACT College Readiness Benchmarks. This compares to 18,511 and 14,445 (60 and 53 percent) out of 2017 and 2014 graduates, respectively. For reference, the national percentage of 2018 graduates meeting three or four benchmarks was 38%.

STEM

- In 2018, 15,711 Pennsylvania graduates (57 percent) indicated having an interest in STEM majors and/or careers.
 - ~ Nationally, 45 percent of graduates indicated having an interest in STEM.
- The STEM benchmark is an indicator of whether a student is well prepared for the types of first-year college courses required for a college STEM-related major. The STEM ACT College Readiness Benchmark is 26.
- Compared to 35 percent of 2018 Pennsylvania graduates meeting the ACT STEM College Readiness Benchmark, graduates in 2017 and 2014 had STEM Benchmark percentages of 36 and 30, respectively.
- In 2018, 20,760 Pennsylvania graduates (75 percent) indicated taking physics. This compares to 77 and 77 percent for the 2017 and 2014 graduating classes, respectively.
- 2018 graduates taking physics had an average science score of 23.9, compared to 20.7 for students not taking physics.
 - ~ 2018 Pennsylvania graduates meeting the ACT STEM College Readiness Benchmark had an average science score of 28.9. This compares to 28.2 in 2014.
- In 2018, 26,680 Pennsylvania graduates (96 percent) indicated taking three or more years of math. This compares to 97 and 97 percent for 2017 and 2014 graduating classes, respectively.
 - ~ 2018 graduates taking three or more years of math had an average math score of 23.3, compared to 17.2 for students taking less than three years of math.
 - ~ 61 percent of 2018 graduates taking three or more years of math met the ACT Math College Readiness Benchmark, compared to 14 percent for students taking less than three years of math.

Career Readiness

- In 2018, 11,807 Pennsylvania graduates (43 percent) were likely to attain the Gold ACT WorkKeys® National Career Readiness Certificate® or higher based upon ACT Composite score, compared to 499,653 (26 percent) nationally.
 - ~ The ACT Composite scores associated with a 50% chance of earning each ACT WorkKeys NCRC® level or higher are: 13 for Bronze, 17 for Silver, 25 for Gold, and 35 for Platinum. Based on those cut scores, students who earned an ACT Composite score of less than 13 would be classified as "Needs Improvement," 13 to 16 as "Bronze." 17 to 24 as "Silver." and 25 or above as "Gold or Higher."

Impact

- Based on the actual test volume and ACT score distributions of 2018 ACT-tested Pennsylvania high school graduates, ACT research estimates that an increase of 0.1 in state average ACT Composite score for the 2018 graduating class would result in:
 - ~ 58 more students enrolling in college.
 - ~ 68 more students persisting to year two.
 - ~ 42 fewer students needing remedial English.
 - ~ 71 fewer students needing remedial math.
 - ~ 78 more students persisting to year four.
 - ~ 85 more students earning a postsecondary degree within six years.

Behaviors that Impact Access and Opportunity

- In Pennsylvania, 9,224 of the 2018 graduates (33.3%) taking the ACT two or more times had an average Composite score of 25.0, compared to an average of 22.8 for 18,470 of the 2018 graduates (66.7%) who took the ACT only once.
- 33,473 score reports were sent to colleges by 2018 Pennsylvania ACT-tested graduates.
 - ~ 8,479 score reports were sent to in-state public colleges by 2018 Pennsylvania ACT-tested graduates.
 - ~ For Pennsylvania's 2018 ACT-tested graduates, the top five schools to which scores were sent were Penn State-University Park Campus, University of Pittsburgh, Temple University, West Chester University of Pennsylvania, and Duquesne University.
 - ~ For Pennsylvania's 2018 ACT-tested graduates, the top three out-of-state schools to which scores were sent were West Virginia University, University of Delaware, and The Ohio State University.
- Compared to 68 percent of 2018 graduates nationally, 64 percent of Pennsylvania graduates opted into the ACT Educational Opportunity Service (EOS). EOS is a free service that allows students to gain exposure to recruitment, scholarship agencies, colleges, and universities that students may not have accessed on their own. The ACT Get Your Name in the Game initiative encourages colleges and universities to recruit underserved EOS participants to increase access and opportunity for all.
 - ~ Compared to 79 percent of African American students nationally, 82 percent of Pennsylvania African American 2018 graduates opted into EOS.
 - ~ Compared to 80 percent of Hispanic students nationally, 74 percent of Pennsylvania Hispanic 2018 graduates opted into EOS.
- In the 2017-2018 academic year, ACT issued 7,402 ACT fee waivers to qualified Pennsylvania students. However, 2,325 students (31.4 percent) did not take advantage of this opportunity to test for free. This compares to 542,506 waivers issued nationally, of which 152,227 (28.1 percent) students did not take advantage. This represents a great opportunity for high schools within the state to increase the socioeconomic diversity of its students tested. Note: this is the number of fee waivers issued for the state, not specific to this graduating class.


Pipeline

- Aspirations matter. Students who aspire to a higher level of postsecondary education typically achieve higher ACT Composite scores.
 - ~ 13,475 students (49 percent) aspired to attain a graduate or professional degree. They had an average Composite score of 25.3.
 - ~ 10,811 students (39 percent) aspired to attain a bachelor's degree. They had an average Composite score of 22.1.
- In the Pennsylvania graduating class of 2018, 2,102 students (8 percent) had parents who did not attend college.
- In order of prevalence, the five most commonly indicated college majors of interest for 2018 Pennsylvania graduates were: Undecided; Nursing, Registered (BS/RN); Medicine (Pre-Medicine); Biology, General; and Business Administration and Management, General.
 - ~ In the Pennsylvania graduating class of 2018, 1,054 (4 percent) indicated planning on majoring in education. They had an average Composite score of 21.3.

Additional Points

- According to the US Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics, the fastest-growing careers in Pennsylvania requiring education beyond high school are: Home Health and Personal Care Aides, Computer Systems Analysts, Software Developers and Computer and Information Systems Managers.

Percent of 2018 ACT-Tested High School Graduates Meeting ACT College Readiness Benchmarks* by Subject



Percent of 2014–2018 ACT-Tested High School Graduates Meeting ACT College Readiness Benchmarks*



■ Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Isl..



Percent of 2018 ACT-Tested High School Graduates by ACT College Readiness Benchmark Attainment and Subject



■ National: Those Attaining 0 CRBs



Percent of 2014-2018 ACT-Tested High School Graduates by Race/Ethnicity




